

CHAPTER - I

THE CENTRAL ZOO AUTHORITY

In India, zoos are regulated under the provisions of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972. The Central Zoo Authority was created by the Government of India in 1992, as an autonomous statutory body to oversee and monitor the management of zoos in the country. The mandate of the Central Zoo Authority is to specify minimum standards for housing, upkeep and veterinary care of the animals kept in the stock of various zoos, evaluate and assess the functioning of zoos, recognise and derecognise them, identify endangered species of wild animals for purposes of captive breeding and coordinate research, exchange programmes and training of zoo personnel. The Authority is headed by Minister, Environment & Forests, Secretary (E&F); Inspector General of Forests & Addl Inspector General of Forests (Wildlife) are the official members of the Authority. For carrying out the instructions of the Authority and to monitor the action taken by the officers in the Central Zoo Authority, two committees namely Administrative Committee and Technical Committee have been constituted.

The Administrative Committee is chaired by the Inspector General of Forests. The Committee has four Members and the Member Secretary of the Authority is the convenor of the Committee. The main functions of the Committee are:

- 1. To screen and approve the proposals regarding creation of posts and upgradation of the existing posts in the Authority.
- 2. To approve proposals for awarding consultancies and contract appointments to Group'A' posts.
- 3. To approve proposal for grant of research projects to various institutions.
- 4. To approve annual budget of the Central Zoo Authority.
- 5. Any other matter referred to it by the Central Zoo Authority.

The Addl Inspector General of Forests (Wildlife) chairs the Technical Committee. The committee has seven members and the Member Secretary is the convenor of the committee. The functions of the Committee are as follows:

1. To approve proposals for release of financial assistance to various zoos.

- 2. To approve exchange programme of zoo animals between Indian zoos.
- 3. To make recommendations regarding exchange of animals with foreign zoos, accepting gift of animals from foreign zoos and gifting animals to foreign zoos.
- 4. To approve proposals for organising training programmes, workshops and meetings on various aspects of zoo management.
- 5. To screen research projects on issues related with zoos for funding by the Authority.
- 6. To approve the proposals for grant of recognition to mini zoos.
- 7. To make recommendations regarding grant of recognition to large, medium and small zoo.

8... Any other function that may be assigned to it by the Central Zoo Authority from time to time.

Overview of the activities of the Central Zoo Authority during the year 1998-99

- 1. Evaluation of the zoos, with reference to minimum standards and norms fixed under "Recognition of Zoo Rules, 1992", was continued and the zoos which had a potential to improve were granted conditional recognition. The zoos, which had little chance to come up to the prescribed standards, were refused recognition and asked to close down.
- Financial assistance on upgraded funding pattern
 was provided to zoos for improvement of
 housing, upkeep and veterinary care of animals.
 Zoos at Surat, Rajkot and Port Blair were given
 financial assistance for re-location to new sites

as per the Central Zoo Authority's directive. Financial assistance as per new master plan was also provided to Gwalior Zoo. In addition, eleven other zoos have also been provided financial assistance for improvement/ construction of naturalistic enclosures for animals. Five zoos were given assistance for upgrading their veterinary care facilities.

3. Exchange programmes were encouraged between zoos to facilitate breeding of endangered species.


Capsule courses were organised for upgrading

- technical skills of zoo directors, zoo veterinarians, zoo supervisors and keepers.
- 5. The Central Zoo Authority continued sponsoring the research projects undertaken by Centre for Cellular and Molecular Biology (CCMB), Hyderabad on assisted reproduction and determination of the degree of inbreeding amongst the zoo animals.
- 6, A research project was awarded to Wildlife
 Institute of India, Dehradun to study infectious
 viral diseases in Asiatic lions.

CHAPTER - II

IMPORTANT DECISIONS OF THE CENTRAL ZOO AUTHORITY

- 1. Create rescue facility in off the display area of zoo for rehabilitation of animals rescued/ received as a result of derecognition of zoos/ circuses.
- 2. Appropriate policy for manning the zoos should be evolved.
- 3. Creation of mini zoos and deer parks should be discouraged as they have failed to serve the cause of conservation.
- 4. Surplus herbivore animals from zoos should not be released in the wild unless proper screening for infectious diseases and genetic purity has been carried out.
- 5. The Authority should be more proactive about upgrading the housing of animals in zoos, particularly through involvement in master planning and enclosure designing process.

CHAPTER - III

EVALUATION AND GRANT OF RECOGNITION TO ZOOS

During the year under report, second round of evaluation of following five medium and two small zoos were completed. These are:

Medium Zoos

Small Zoos

The decision on granting of further recognition to the zoos will be decided by the Authority in its next meeting.

During the year under report, 18 mini zoos were evaluated. Out of these, following mini zoos were granted conditional recognition:

Other eight mini zoos were refused recognition and their list is placed at Annexure-I.

The authority also decided to refuse recognition to 14 mini zoos/ deer parks in the State of Karnataka, which were evaluated in the previous year. The list of zoos refused recognition is placed at Annexure-I.

CHAPTER - IV

PLANNED BREEDING OF ENDANGERED SPECIES

- 1. Under the planned breeding programme of Bengal Tigers, first birth was recorded at Nehru Zoological Park, Hyderabad.
- 2. Asiatic lions identified under the planned breeding programme were moved from Sakkarbagh Zoo, Junagarh to Kamla Nehru Zoological Park, Ahmedabad; Kanpur Zoological park, National Zoological Park, Delhi and Nehru Zoological Park, Hyderabad. Animals to Arignar Anna Zoological Park, Chennai will be moved soon.
- 3. A meeting of the Zoo Directors was organised by the Central Zoo Authority at Kanpur. The Zoo Directors, experts from various fields and scientists were invited to participate in the

Workshop on National Zoo Policy and deliberate on its role in developing a plan for conservation breeding of animals in Indian zoos.


Exchange Programmes:

The Technical Committee of the Central Zoo Authority met on 4th August 1998; 6th November, 1998 and 8th March 1999. The Committee reviewed the exchange proposals submitted by zoos. On the basis of the decisions taken by the Committee and under the powers delegated to the Member Secretary, proposals for exchange, loaning and gifting of zoo animals within the country and zoos outside India were approved. 

CHAPTER - V

EDUCATION & AWARENESS

- A. During the year under review, a Sub-Committee on Zoo Education was constituted with the approval of the Chairman. The main function of the Sub-Committee are:
- 1. To formulate draft guidelines for basic education programmes for different categories of zoos.
- To set up mechanism for regular training of zoo directors, educators and persons responsible for zoo education.
- 3. To develop zoo/conservation oriented subject matter for National curricula for different levels

- of students (Lower kindergarten to under graduate level)
- 4. To develop material for zoo education,
- 5. To conduct workshops involving policy makers, zoo personnel, schoolteachers and general public.
- B. The Central Zoo Authority and the Indian Zoo Directors Association continued to bring out the quarterly news letter for sharing of technical information on important aspects of zoo management in the country. The IInd volume of

- the Compendium consisting of research papers published by scientists, zoo veterinarians and directors on animal biology and conservation was published.
- C. Sanjay Gandhi Biological park, Patna; Arignar Anna Zoological Park, Chennai; Sri Chamarajendra Zoological Park, Mysore and National Zoological Park, Delhi continued to organise
- guided tours for zoo visitors, to make the visits more rewarding and interesting.
- D. Zoo outreach Organisation continued to bring out Zoo Zen and Zoos Print.

The two magazines continued to be an important source of technical information on scientific management of zoos.

CHAPTER - VI

RESEARCH AND TRAINING

- 1. A two weeks' capsule course for Zoo Directors was organised at Arignar Anna Zoological Park, Chennai from 1st to 12th Sept., 1998. The trainees were apprised of the modern concept of zoo designing, collection planning and record keeping. Information on planned breeding programmes for endangered species was also provided.
- 2. 15 days training programme for zoo keepers was organised at Nehru Zoological park, Hyderabad
- from 24.2.98 to 5.3.98, Kamla Nehru Zoological Park, Ahmedabad from 9.2.98 to 18.2.98 Assam State Zoo, Guwahati from 16.10.98 to 25.10.98 and Kanpur Zoological Park, Kanpur from 5.1.99 to 15.1.99. In all, 70-zoo keepers attended the course in the above said zoos.
- 3. A training programme on 'Zoo Animal Nutrition' for Zoo Keepers was organised by Arignar Anna Zoological Park, Vandaluar on 18.12.98.

- 4. Shri N.Rajsekhar, Executive Director, Zoo Authority of Karnataka and Director, Mysore Zoo along with Dr. S.M.Razvi, Superintendent, Aurangabad Zoo participated in a three weeks' course on Conservation of endangered species at Durrell Wildlife Preservation Trust, U.K during July-August, 1998.
- 5. The Centre for Cellular and Molecular Biology(CCMB), Hyderabad continued to work on the projects associated with assisted reproduction and DNA fingerprinting of endangered species in Indian zoos.
- 6. The study on social impact of mini zoos and deer parks in the three regions of the country

- namely, North, south and east were completed by A.E.D.R, JNU New Delhi, Indian Institute of Management, Bangalore, and Xavier Institute of Management, Bhubaneswar. The study revealed that:
- (i) Majority of visitors come to deer parks /mini zoos for recreational purpose.
- (ii) Except for some mini zoos in rural areas, educational role of deer parks is minimal.
- (iii) Management of deer parks/mini zoos is poor.
- (iv) Majority of the visitors want multi-species display.
- 7. The Wildlife Institute of India was awarded a research project on Scroepidomological study of infectious diseases in Asiatic Lions

CHAPTER - VII

INTERNATIONAL CO-OPERATION

1. Shri K.L. Velodi, President Indian Zoo Directors Association attended the IUDZG meeting held in Yokohama, Japan.

- 2. Mr. Bernard Harrison, Chief Executive Singapore Zoological Garden, was invited by the Central Zoo Authority to assist the Uttar Pradesh Government in finalization of a master plan for creation of a Zoo near the Taj Mahal at Agra.
- 3. Dr. Andrew Routh from Royal Society for Preservation of Cruelty to Animals (RSPCA), Great Britain conducted a training programme for veterinarians on treatment of birds at Blue Cross of India, Chennai during January, 1999. Veterinarians from Hyderabad Zoo, Mysore Zoo, Trianvandurm Zoo and Vandalur Zoo participated in the training programme.

The post of Personal Secretary was downgraded to the post of Personal Assistant with the approval of the Administrative Committee. The post of Personal Secretary will be kept in abeyance till the incumbent on the post of Personal Assistant becomes eligible for this post according to the recruitment rules.

The post of Data Processing Assistant, which fell vacant during the year and that of Personal Assistant were advertised during the year.

Dr.J.H.Desai left the Central Zoo Authority at the end of November, 1998 and Shri Brij Kishor Gupta joined as Scientist on contract basis in January, 1999. Shri Bipul Chakrabarty continued to work on contract basis to assist the Member Secretary in discharge of statutory duties and preparation of Database on Zoos. Shri W.C.Arora, a retired IES officer, continued to work as Registrar on contract basis. The post of Accountant could not be filled up on

deputation basis. Therefore, a retired person of Civil Accounts Service has been engaged on contract basis to attend the work as Accountant. One casual worker Shri Gopal Swamy was granted temporary status as per the general orders of the Government.

CHAPTER - IX FINANCIAL MATTERS

The Expenditure Finance Committee approved continuation of the plan scheme 'Grants-in-Aid to Central Zoo Authority' for the Ninth Plan Period and approved enhancement of funding pattern for providing financial assistance for housing, upkeep and healthcare of zoo animals from 50% to 100% basis with effect from the year 1998-99. During the year, financial assistance worth Rs. 393.14 lakhs was provided to 20 zoos. A list of zoos, which received financial assistance from the Central Zoo Authority during 1998-99, is at Annexure-III.

ANNUAL ACCOUNTS

The annual accounts of Central Zoo Authority were prepared and submitted to the Principal Director of Audit, Scientific Department on 17th May, 1999. The audit of accounts was carried out by a team from the office of the Principal Director of Audit, Scientific Department from 1st June, 1999 to 18th June, 1999.
